General background (describe your professional life in a paragraph):

I have been teaching legal writing since 1997 and writing scholarship about legal writing since 2000. I have published many times, but perhaps my two most important contributions have been initial articles in what have grown to be two sub-disciplines of legal writing. Those are the two avenues of inquiry in the discipline are legal-document design, and legal storytelling.

At home at Rutgers I also work on issues related to domestic violence and sexual assault, starting the law school's domestic violence clinic in 2004. Currently, my work in this area is mostly legislative advocacy.

I have served the discipline through leadership on the LWI Board including being an LWI President, and on the editorial board of ALWD's journal, Legal Communication & Rhetoric: JALWD, where I am the co-editor in chief. I have received state-wide recognition for my work as a legal advocate and both university-wide and region-wide recognition for my teaching capabilities.

Areas of scholarly interest consistent with the purpose of the grant program ("The Legal Communication & Rhetoric Visiting Scholars Grants are intended to further support, strengthen, and encourage scholarship focusing on the study and practice of professional legal writing."):

- 1) Legal-document design (this includes the designing of legal documents by attorneys, and also scholarship about the design of legal documents. The first type of scholarship is the "what should a lawyer do when designing" kind of scholarship. The second looks in particular at the state of iconography of legal tender (paper money) and compares it to the way that iconography appears on things like coins and stamps.
- 2) Applied Legal Storytelling—this is broader because I have written multiple articles and a textbook on the topic. I typically focus on things that can be described (actions, settings, characters, objects), the ways to describe them, and the idea of selecting and chaining description together to form the cause/effect flow. The presentation draws from my articles and my textbook chapters.
